In a Word

We need to persevere!

Hard as it is for some of us to believe, we have now begun our eighth year as a church! Considering our modest beginning — twenty-five of us meeting, first in **Milvern and Aloha Harrel's** home in June of '99, then in a succession of rented facilities — it's equally difficult to comprehend just how far God has brought us these seven years. Those early adventurous years called for the creative cooperation of us all, as together each Sunday we set up for Sunday school and church, then a few hours later, put it all away, sometimes wondering where we would next meet. We watched in awe as God directed our path — closing some doors, allowing us to wait, then opening others, all the while bringing to our fellowship families and individuals drawn by God's love expressed through our ever-growing Redeemer family. In his perfect time God gave us this just-right-for-us facility we now enjoy. I mention all this to stir grateful memories for some and give more recent family members a better sense of who we are and whence we have come. Then to remind us all that we need to persevere.

Most new projects and ventures — whether school semester, job, marriage, exercise program, hobby, sport, or church — are launched with optimistic dreams and plans, bursts of enthusiasm, and boundless energy. In time, those hopes and dreams inevitably collide with reality, the reality that nothing goes quite as planned, that almost everything is more difficult and pain-

ful, takes longer, and costs more than we planned or imagined. As time passes, that early enthusiasm must be strengthened and stabilized with dogged determination and patient perseverance. This is true of us as individual believers, and as a church family.

Like many of us, the believers to whom the New Testament book, *Hebrews*, was written, had walked with the Lord for years, many of them second-generation Christians. A major message to them is summarized in the opening words of 10:36 — *You need to persevere*. It is a message we need to hear and heed as well.

From time to time we all need the reminder I see on my study wall almost every day, *It's too soon to quit!* The call to perseverance permeates the Bible, both precept and example: *Blessed is the man (woman, youth, child) who perseveres under trial, because when he has stood the test, he will receive the crown of life that God has promised to those that love him* (James 1:12). *Moses persevered because he saw him who is invisible* (Hebrews 11:27).

When you feel the need of a little encouragement to persevere, turn to Hebrews 10:19 and read slowly and prayerfully through 12:3. Note especially the *Let us . . .* clauses (10:22, 23, 24, 25, 25, 12:1, 1). Respond to those simple, powerful challenges that tell us how to persevere, then watch God restore your dream and renew your enthusiasm for whatever it is he has called you to do. He will energize us to continue to run our race with perseverance and joy.

As a church I believe we are persevering, and with a passion born of love for God, fueled by heart-felt worship, and motivated by a desire to love each other and those God intends for us to touch.

In a word, we need to persevere!

Getting to Know You: Clarence George

Clarence George was born in Collin County on December 11, 1921. "I had great plans to come to Dallas when I graduated from high school," he said. "However, my mom passed away when I was eighteen, so I stayed home with my dad to help with my sisters. After a year or so, I received a letter from my 'uncle' (Uncle Franklin D. Roosevelt), congratulating me for being selected to help defend our country! I was inducted into the Army in September, 1942."

After Clarence completed his basic training, he was transferred several times and ended up in the South Pacific. Clarence commented, "They told us it was 'destination unknown,' but we landed in Holandia, New Guinea. Later, we moved to Fenchheaven – where our missionaries, the **Doriots** serve. Sometime later, Roger told me, 'You were on the east side, and we were on the west!'" Two of Clarence's unique military memories are seeing General Douglas MacArthur's car in Manila and being in the Philippines when the atomic bomb was dropped on Japan.

As special as his military memories might be, they pale in comparison to those of his wife of 57 years, **Jessie** (in whose honor Redeemer's pulpit was built). With a twinkle in his eye, Clarence spoke about a Saturday night in McKinney that changed his life. Clarence, his cousin, and a friend of his cousin were inside a store "when this red-headed girl walked in." With a smile, he added: "Wow! I thought she was the most beautiful young lady I had ever

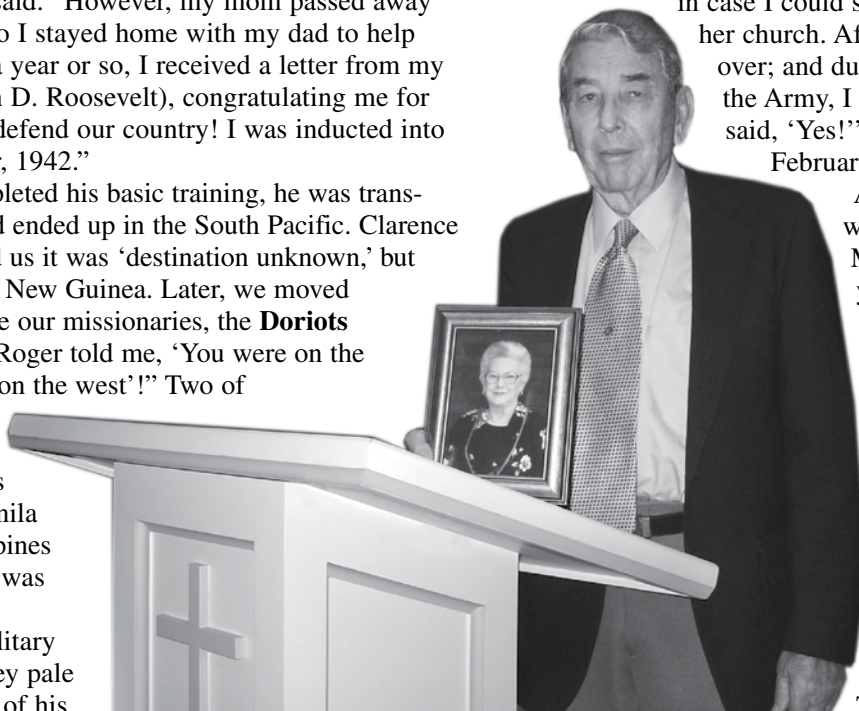
seen. My cousin and his friend knew Jessie and introduced us. After I met her, I would go over to my cousin's on Sundays just in case I could see her as she came home from her church. After about two years, I won her over; and during my first three-day leave from the Army, I asked her to marry me, and she said, 'Yes!'" Jessie and Clarence married on February 11, 1943.

After the Army, Clarence worked for Continental Electric Manufacturing for thirty-eight years. Living on Redondo Drive in the Casa Linda area, Clarence and Jessie attended Reinhardt Bible Church for years. Blessed by their Reinhardt experience, Clarence said, "When **Don** and **Alice** came back from Indiana and started Redeemer, we were thrilled and came right away.

E.W. Cavender told us that we were charter members! Jessie, **Evelyn Ward**, and Alice Geiger worked in the nursery together. This church has meant so much

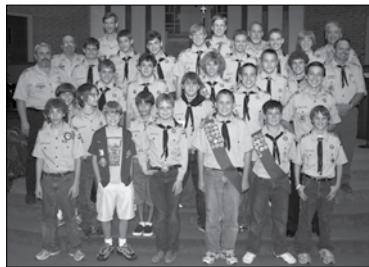
to us, especially when the Lord took Jessie to heaven on May 21, 2000. I miss her so much; but I am thankful that my daughter, **Charlotte**, and her family live in the area."

Take Time to Play

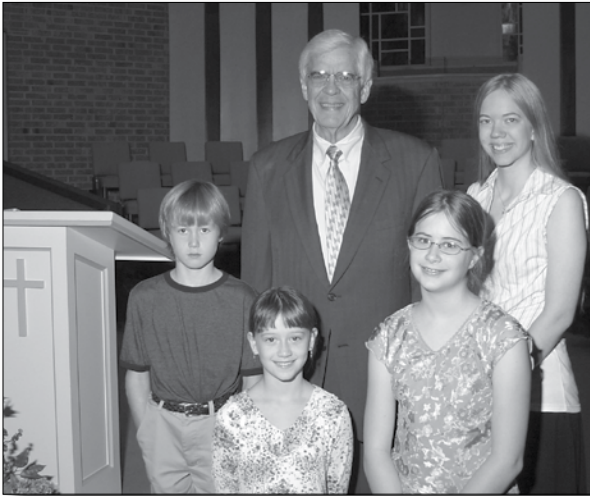
Fridays at Redeemer are family-focused, fun-filled times of fellowship, thanks to our First-Friday childcare and our Friday afternoon play days.
